Planning Department



The face of America is changing. 40% of young adults 18-24 are enrolled in college or graduate school. The United States also has the lowest number of births since 1979. There are fewer

families, more single people with college debt, and a large demographic of people who are aging. By 2025, up to 85% of households will not have children at home and by 2030, one in five people will be over the age of 65.

The 2022 American Community Survey lists the median price for a home with a mortgage in the United States at \$354,100, while the median household income is \$104,421. As empty nesters age, they may want to downsize, and a young adult fresh out of college may not be ready to afford a mortgage but would like to have the option to live on their own. Yet for decades, zoning regulations have prioritized single-family homes, which have grown larger over time. According to *The New York Times*, the average square footage of new housing in the southern United States in 2022 was 2,608 square feet compared to the average 1,500 square feet of homes from the 1960s.

Butner is fortunate. In our historic Town Center, we have a variety of housing types that still exist today. For example, along 12th Street, there are duplexes and townhomes that are in character with the existing smaller single-family homes. In-fill development is placing some larger homes into these neighborhoods, which adds variety.

Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) were traditionally called mother-in-law suites and allow for a second, smaller home to be built on any property with a single-family dwelling unit. The Town of Butner has been allowing ADUs since its incorporation in 2007. We value the variety we offer our citizens and have planned for it to continue with our 2040 Future Land Use Plan.

Accessory Structures

What do swimming pools, storage sheds, chicken coops, ground-mounted solar arrays, hot tubs, carports, and fences have in common? They all require a zoning permit! If you are planning on adding any of these to your property, please visit the Town of Butner Planning website to get an application or contact the planning office at planning@butnernc.org.

BUTNER QUARTERLY DEVELOPMENT DATA

The Town of Butner has issued 19 permits from July 1, 2023 - September 30, 2023, for a total value of \$468,176.72.

Cooking Safety Starts with YOU

The 2023 Fire Prevention Week theme for this year is focusing on cooking safety to educate the public about simple but important steps they can take to help reduce the risk of fire when cooking in order to keep themselves and those around them safe.



According to NFPA, cooking is the leading cause of home fires, with nearly half (49%) of all home fires involving cooking equipment. Cooking is also the leading cause of home fire injuries. Unattended cooking is the leading cause of home cooking fires and related deaths.

Following are cooking safety messages that support this year's theme, "Cooking safety starts with YOU! Pay attention to fire prevention":

- Always keep a close eye on what you're cooking. For foods with longer cooking times, such as those that are simmering or baking, set a timer to help monitor them carefully.
- Clear the cooking area of combustible items and anything that can burn, such as dish towels, oven mitts, food packaging, and paper towels.
- Turn the pot handles toward the back of the stove. Keep a lid nearby when cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan and turn off the burner.

Create a "kid and pet-free zone" of at least three feet (one meter) around the cooking area and anywhere else hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

Most home fires start out very small and then grow as it consumes more fuel and creates more heat. Arm yourself with a fire extinguisher to help extinguish small self-contained fires from spreading out of control. It is recommended to have a dedicated extinguisher for the kitchen due to the higher likelihood of a fire.

How to use a fire extinguisher:

Using a fire extinguisher is as easy as remembering the word PASS.

- **P** Pull the pin and hold the extinguisher with the nozzle pointing away from you.
- A Aim low at the base of the fire.
- **S** Squeeze the lever slowly and evenly to discharge the extinguishing agent. (When the agent first hits the fire, the fire may briefly flare up. This should be expected.)
- **S** Sweep the nozzle from side to side, moving carefully toward the fire. Keep the extinguisher aimed at the base of the fire.

When to use a fire extinguisher

It's important to remember that fire extinguishers are only one element of a complete fire survival plan. Only use your extinguisher after making sure:

- All residents of the home have been evacuated to safety.
- The fire department has been notified.
- There is a clear exit behind the person using the extinguisher.
