What the New Interstate 885 Means for Butner

Interstate 885, also known as the East End Connector, has been in the works since the 1950's. It will provide a stop-light free, limited access connection from I-85 to I-40.

Once complete, the East End Connector will be a 3.9-mile fourlane freeway with space for a future third lane in each direction. In addition to building a new roadway, work involves building 16 bridges, rehabilitating four others and installing four culverts on U.S. 70, N.C. 147 and other locations in the project area.

What the project means to Butner is far more important than the project details however. The new 885 freeway means residents and visitors can drive to/from Butner without hitting a single stoplight between us and Raleigh-Durham International Airport, Research Triangle Park, Raleigh, Cary...Wilmington. The new freeway puts Butner closer to downtown Durham, RTP, RDU, than most of the "boomtowns" in southern Wake: Holly Springs, Fuquay, Apex, etc..

The implications for Butner may be significant in the next 10-20 years. In the meantime, enjoy the faster travel.

HISTORIC BUTNER'S UMSTEAD SITE: A KEY TO BUTNER'S FUTURE? Butner Town Center and the Reuse of the Umstead Correction Center Site

What Is a Town Center?

A town center is an enduring, walkable, and integrated open-air, multiuse development that is organized around a clearly identifiable and energized public realm where citizens can gather and strengthen their community bonds. It is anchored by retail, dining, and leisure uses, as well as by vertical or horizontal residential uses. At least one other type of development is included in a town center, such as office, hospitality, civic, and cultural uses.

Given what we know about how development follows transportation, the opening of the I-885 Freeway could mean more growth for Butner in the coming years. Butner has a unique oppor-

tunity to develop a town center that will be a place we can walk to show off to guests, meet your neighbors, shop, eat, drink, live, work, and enjoy a quality of life to rival the best towns in America. The Town of Butner Planning Department along with the Town Council have hosted a series of visioning sessions to connect with a diverse cross-section of community and business leaders, elected officials, and residents. The goal is to develop an action-oriented and comprehensive Vision that will guide and support Town Center revitalization and redevelopment efforts for the next ten years. The consensus for a mixture of uses including places for people to age in Butner; community facilities; and, outdoor dining and offices and residences above ground floor retail/restaurants.

Proactive planning is important to spur investment in housing, commercial development, culture, and recreation, and will serve as a policy and visual guide for Butner Town Center's growth and the reuse of the Umstead Correctional Center site. This Vision will recommend changes to the built environment that could be made over the course of the next ten years given current demographic profiles, economic conditions, and community goals, as well as an examination of international, national, regional, and local trends that will impact development patterns in the community.

Specifically, the Vision will determine:

1.) How to reuse/develop the former Umstead Correctional Site;

2.) How to make Butner's "Main Street", Central Avenue, a destination that reflects the Town's aspirations, serves a diverse population of residents, workers, and visitors utilizing sound design principles;

3.) The changes needed to the existing development rules to make the Vision a reality.

FAVORITE RECIPE

Sugar Cookies - Susan Hiscocks, Town of Butner Finance Director

1 ³⁄₄ cups sugar

2 sticks of margarine or butter

¾ cup vegetable oil

2 eggs at room temperature

Mix together with a mixer for 4 minutes

Sift together the following dry ingredients into a separate bowl. Add to butter/sugar mixture and mix by hand until combined.

4 cups all purpose flour

1 tsp. salt

1 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. cream of tartar

Add 1 tsp vanilla to dough and stir until combined.

Drop dough by the teaspoon onto a greased cookie sheet the press dough down with a fork dipped in water.

Bake at 350° on the top rack of the oven until golden brown. Remove cookies from pan to layer

of paper towels to cool.

Makes about 96 cookies
